Course Overview

Transgender individuals are often misunderstood. This misunderstanding is likely the single greatest contributing factor to stigmatization and resultant adverse outcomes. By utilizing expertise presented to review medical, psychological, social, historical and educational factors and implications related to transgender individuals, the increase in understanding can lead to a healthier and safer diverse community.

The day's 5 hour program will expand the participant's knowledge base as well as provide useful insights into strategies and interventions on these issues confronting young people, as well as research and public policy that form the foundation for the response to these problems.

The program will again combine nationally recognized experts with local expert presenters, utilizing both individual presentations followed by a panel discussion and question and answer period.

Cost

Course Objectives

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- 1. Define and use terms and concepts related to gender diversity, including gender biology, expression and identity, and genderexpansive.
- 2. Describe perspectives and experiences of gender-expansive children and the families who are raising them.
- 3. Identify the components of a gender-inclusive school and the role they might play in helping to establish it.
- 4. Differentiate between gender identity and gender expressions and implications for treatment.
- 5. Assess whether a child is demonstrating gender stress or distress or dysphoria.
- 6. Delineate the three major therapeutic models for treating gendernonconforming children and their families.
- 7. Apply a non-pathologizing developmental model of gender variations in children to clinical work.
- 8. Demonstrate increased capacity to explore the psychodynamics of parenting a gender-nonconforming child.
- 9. Implement a treatment plan with a therapeutic goal of increasing gender health.
- 10. Identify co-existing psychological problems or issues that may accompany gender nonconformity.
- 11. Recognize the significance of collaborative interdisciplinary team work in promoting gender health.
- 12. Utilize appropriate and current gender terminology and understand the difference between gender and sexuality.
- 13. Apply best practices for creating a transgender friendly health care setting, including gender affirmative care.
- 14. Learn about resources in the area of transgender medical and mental health care.
- 15. Be exposed to the process of transition with hormones and surgical options, including risks and benefits.

Presenters

Joel Baum, MS

Joel Baum, MS, Senior Director of Professional Development and Family Services, is responsible for all programmatic aspects at Gender Spectrum. He facilitates trainings, conducts workshops, develops curriculum, consults with parents/ professionals, and provides resources in service of a more compassionate understanding of gender. He is a founding member and Director of Education and Advocacy with the Child and Adolescent Gender Center at UCSF. Working throughout the United States and beyond, he is frequently called upon to help institutions think more expansively about the gender diversity of all children and teens, and ways to create more inclusive conditions accordingly. For nearly 30 years, Joel's work as an educator has focused on issues of social justice and equity. First as an award-winning middle school science teacher and school administrator, he has also served as a district administrator in Oakland, California, as well as a school reform coach with the National Equity Project. Joel is also a professor at California State University, East Bay in the Department of Educational Leadership.

Diane Ehrensaft, Ph.D.

Diane Ehrensaft, Ph.D. is an associate professor of Pediatrics at the University of California San Francisco and a developmental and clinical psychologist in the San Francisco Bay Area, with a private practice in Oakland, California. She is Director of Mental Health of the Child and Adolescent Gender Center and chief psychologist at the Child and Adolescent Gender Center Clinic at UCSF Benioff Children's Hospital. She specializes in research, clinical work, and consultation related to gendernonconforming children and assisted reproductive technology families, lecturing, publishing, and serving as an expert witness on both topics nationally and internationally. Dr. Ehrensaft received her PH.D. from the University of Michigan and has served on the faculty of UCSF, University of California, Berkeley, The Wright Institute, Psychoanalytic Institute of Northern California and Access Institute San Francisco. She is author of Gender Born, Gender Made, Mommies Daddies Donors, Surrogates, Building a Home Within (co-edited with Toni Heineman), Spoiling Childhood, Parenting Together, and the forthcoming book, The Gender Creative Child.

Jennifer Hastings, MD

Jennifer Hastings, MD, majored in Women's Studies at Princeton University was an art teacher and painter before medical school at UCSF, and is grateful for varied life experiences before medicine. As Assistant Clinical Professor, UCSF, Department of Family and Community Medicine, Jen is a family practice physician who started and is Director of the Transgender Health Care Program at Planned Parenthood Mar Monte Santa Cruz and has been actively involved in supporting Transgender Health Care Services for youth and adults around the country. Jen works closely with the Santa Cruz Transgender Therapist Team, and is involved in the integration of Behavioral Health and Primary Care for Safety Net Clinics and with Mindfulness and Medicine. Jen is a member of the Medical Advisory Board of the UCSF Center of Excellence for Transgender Health and intimately involved with Medical Conference Programming for Gender Spectrum. Jen works to increase medical access and understanding about the gender journey.
